

In 2004, MLC implemented the statewide interlibrary loan system provided by Auto-Graphics. The system virtually replicates the idea of a union catalog—a master list of several libraries holdings—by linking library catalogs together and making them searchable. Instead of a list that must be updated whenever items are acquired or deselected, the virtual union catalog allows users to receive up-to-date information about a library's holdings each time a search is completed. The system was temporarily named the Mississippi Virtual Union Catalog and Interlibrary Loan System. That temporary status has lasted over 12 years, but has now come to an end as MLC announces the name has been updated to Beehive

"We wanted a name that would communicate the value of interlibrary loan without using another acronym," said Tracy Carr, Library Services Director. "The honeybee is Mississippi's state insect, and we liked the idea of bees working together for a common cause, like libraries who borrow and loan materials across the state do," said Carr.

The Beehive Resource Sharing name and logo have been updated within the interlibrary loan system, and libraries who advertise the service on their websites are encouraged to update to the new name at their convenience. Let us know if you have any questions!



South Mississippi Regional Library Wins Inaugural Jane Smith Literacy Award

The South Mississippi Regional Library (SMRL), headquartered in Columbia, has received the inaugural Jane Smith Literacy Award, awarded by the Mississippi Library Commission and the Mississippi Center for the Book via the Library of Congress for the Families Read First program. Families Read First is a family reading initiative designed by the South Mississippi Regional Library to encourage families to spend time together reading by educating parents and caregivers on the importance of reading to children at an early age and by providing families with the skills and resources needed to establish positive reading habits in their own households.

The Jane Smith Literacy Award is part of the Library of Congress Literacy Award program and seeks to recognize an existing literacy program that is outside of traditional library service, is innovative in nature, and is in a Mississippi public library. The \$1,000 award is supplied by the Library of Congress. The award is named for longtime Mississippi library champion Jane Smith who sought to improve library service in the state for over 30 years.

"We're excited to award the first Jane Smith Literacy Award to South Mississippi Regional Library," said Mississippi Center for the Book Coordinator Tracy Carr. "The Families Read First program has many different elements that make it deserving of this award: a community book giveaway, training by a licensed early childhood specialist, a community one book program, and future plans to partner with local pediatricians and health departments to provide new parents with reading resources."

A requirement of the Jane Smith Literacy
Award is that the library have community
partners as part of their literacy program.
South Mississippi Regional Library's
community partners are plentiful: the Friends
of the Columbia-Marion County Public Library,
Marion County Kiwanis, Early Steps to School
Success, the Pearl River Valley Opportunity
Head Start program, Marion County Lions
Club, and Columbia First United Methodist
Church.

Ryda Worthy, Youth Services Librarian, who administers the program, said, "We are delighted to receive this award. Not only does it honor Jane Smith, a pioneer in Mississippi librarianship, but it also validates the efforts of Families Read First to increase family literacy in South Mississippi. We plan to use the funds from the award to host this year's early educator workshop, purchase books for our One Book, One Community program, and institute early literacy bags for families with new babies."



PROTECTING THE RIGHT TO READ

MLC's Public Relations Director Susan Liles and Senior Library Consultant Lacy Ellinwood have been working with board members from Big House Books, a non-profit dedicated to getting books into prisons, on a short film entitled *Big House Books:* Protecting the Right to Read. The group hopes to create awareness about the issue of literacy in Mississippi's correctional facilities. They applied for *The Magnifying Glass* grant which is provided by Artless Media. The grant works to pair individuals committed to making crucially important progressive short documentaries with humble financial support. The program supports the lenses of those who know injustice firsthand and are able to quickly bring awareness to specific injustices within their communities.

The group recently learned that they were awarded \$800 by Artless Media and the film will be shown at the Oxford Film Festival in February 2017. These funds will be provided to Big House Books for costs associated with making and promoting the film. Social media will play a major role in the outreach plan for this project so be sure to watch our Facebook for special announcements about screenings and other fun events!

State Agencies Partner to Reach Unserved Mississippi Communities

The Mississippi Arts Commission (MAC), in partnership with the Mississippi Library Commission (MLC), recently launched a special initiative to provide unserved counties with grants for local artists and art programs.

In order to share information about its services and highlight the artists who benefit from them, MAC is hosting a variety of artists at libraries and other community spaces in Chickasaw, George, Humphreys, Issaquena, Jasper, Perry, Smith, and Tunica counties in November and December. After the artists showcase their work in disciplines such as storytelling, music, and dance, MAC staff will discuss how organizations and individuals can apply for grants in the arts. All events are free and open to the public.

"We are grateful to the Mississippi Arts Commission for providing such an outstanding grant opportunity to libraries in these unserved communities," stated Susan Cassagne, Executive Director of MLC. "By partnering with our fellow cultural agency, we are better able to assist the libraries as they struggle to provide outstanding programming for their patrons."
