

Broadband in Mississippi

Internet use in public libraries across the state is more important now than ever before. There are out of work Mississippians applying for jobs and students of all ages taking online courses and exams. Think of all of the various applications and forms that can only be completed online, like tax forms and other government resources. In 2014, according to estimates by the U.S. Census Bureau, 41% of Mississippians reported that they had no high speed internet at home. Libraries provide access for this percentage of our population.

The reality is that most of Mississippi's public libraries don't have sufficient broadband speed to meet these demands. In the 2016 legislative session, the Mississippi Library Commission will be requesting the budgetary funding to level the playing field for all Mississippi communities by insuring that all public library buildings will be connected to fast access fiber broadband.

The federal Universal Service Fund, or E-Rate, provides discounts to schools and libraries for internet



access. The E-Rate program would allow a discounted rate for MLC to provide a reasonably priced, statewide fiber optic and managed WiFi network to connect each of the state's 236 public library buildings.

This transformative project would be completed within two years and at a 95% discount due to the statewide average as determined by E-Rate eligibility. Imagine the return on investment – a statewide fiber network throughout Mississippi for 5% of the cost!

Increased innovation in rural communities can only serve to build economic growth, assist unemployed citizens in successful job searches, and give our students the tools they need to achieve their fullest potential through grant applications, online classes, and exams.

In the vast rural areas of our state where there is limited or no internet connectivity, where are Mississippi's citizens going to find the broadband they need to build economic development, support job growth, and encourage expansion of education? With your support, they can find it at their local public library.

FEATURE FROM THE FIELD State Poet Laureate Visits Lee County

Natasha Trethewey recently spoke at the Lee County Library - this year's Helen Foster Lecturer. Mrs. Helen Foster was instrumental in the establishment of the Lee County Library in 1941 and went on to serve as a member of the inaugural Library Board of Trustees. Mrs. Foster endowed the library with a legacy upon her passing for the purpose of bringing speakers of talent and accomplishment to Lee County. A native of Gulfport, Ms. Trethewey is the Robert W. Woodruff Professor of English and Creative Writing at Emory University. She has served two terms as Poet Laureate of the United States,

from 2012 – 2014. Governor Haley Barbour appointed Ms. Trethewey as Mississippi Poet Laureate for 2012-2016. She is the author of *Thrall* (2012); *Native Guard*, for which she won the 2007 Pulitzer Prize, *Bellocq's Ophelia*, which was named a Notable Book for 2003 by the American Library Association, and *Domestic Work*. In her second term as Poet Laureate, Trethewey's signature project was featured on the PBS NewsHouse Poetry Series known as *Where Poetry Lives*. In this series, Trethewey traveled with Senior Correspondent Jeffrey Brown to various cities across the United States in order to explore

societal issues through a link to poetry, literature, and Trethewey's own personal experiences.



Sensory Story Kits Now Available Through Talking Book Services

The Mississippi Library Commission's Talking Book Services has recently added new materials to their collection. Talking Book Services, which serves Mississippians who are unable to read traditional print books, has added 15 new Sensory Story Kits to their collection of specialized materials. The Sensory Story Kits supplement Talking Book's large collection of Braille and audiobooks. Each story kit contains a book in both print and Braille and is accompanied by items and toys related to the story. The items provide a hands-on way for children to experience books and aid in the comprehension and enjoyment of the story.

The story kits were created with young children with visual impairments in mind, but children of all ages and capabilities can use tactile and sensory exploration to enhance their understanding and enjoyment of books. Erica McCaleb, a Reader's Advisor for Talking Books, said, "Print/Braille books are traditional books with all of the original text and illustrations accompanied with Braille overlays. This allows the books to be read by those with and without visual impairments. They also act as a great starting point for children and parents who are new to Braille."

Sensory Story Kits are available to patrons of Talking Book Services and the Mississippi Library Commission. Story Kits can be sent and returned through the mail. If being used by an individual with a visual impairment, they are shipped through the mail "Free Matter for the Blind and Physically Handicapped." The kits have a loan period of six weeks. Every Child Ready to Read

In the summer of 2015, past participants of the Mississippi Library Leadership Institute were able to compete for project extension funds to complete a project that would positively impact Mississippi Libraries. As part of her project, MLC consultant Ally Watkins obtained several Every Child Ready to Read (ECRR) kits and was trained to provide ECRR training for public librarians.

ECRR is an early literacy initiative provided by the Association for Library Services to Children and the Public Library Association. ECRR focuses on parent and caretaker education. By highlighting five simple practices – talking, playing, singing, reading, writing – librarians can use this program to educate patrons and community members on how best to prepare children under five for school.

As a pilot project for extending ECRR to Mississippi libraries, Watkins brought this training to the youth services librarians at the Madison County Library System (MCLS), who are currently in the process of implementing the skills and practices that they learned in their programming and collection development efforts. Jaclyn Anderson, youth services coordinator of MCLS, said, "Having the ECRR training at

MCLS gave us the tools we needed to further our early literacy initiative. Since the training, we have incorporated the ECRR practices in our story times, included educational toys for use throughout the library, created circulating educational kits, and given away free early literacy resource kits to parents and educators. Additionally, two of our staff are now certified with the state to provide early literacy trainings to daycare employees."

When equipped with ECRR skills, library staff are ready to help a patron base that is vital to youth services: caregivers. With this program, librarians can provide caregivers with simple tools that will help children's literacy skills.

MLC has a limited number of the ECRR kits; training and materials will be provided through an application process that opens in the spring of 2016. For more information, contact Ally Watkins at 601-432-4066 or awatkins@mlc.lib.ms.us.

ART AT MLC


For 10 years, MLC has featured the outstanding work of some of Mississippi's most talented artists.
